CONSENT AGENDA

HOUSING COMMITTEE

1. Operating Fund income inflation Factor and Utility Expense Level (UEL) inflation/deflation Factor

<u>Background</u>: Although 2017 Operating Fund funding levels were less than 2016, HUD determined that 2017 funding was sufficient to fund 92.9 percent of PHAs' anticipated formula eligibility, higher than the 2016 proration. This was due to declines in Operating Fund formula eligibility from 2016 to 2017 caused by high formula income inflation factors and utility expense level (UEL) deflation.

For 2017, HUD applied inflation factors between 6 and 8 percent for 2017 formula income. This is significantly higher than HUD's inflation factor for any other year. It is most likely that external occurrences are driving the significant increase in the income inflation factor. HUD noted that the end of the recession and the implementation of flat rents could have been contributing factors to the dramatic income inflation increase. They also noted that they use a five-year average to try to soften the impact of changes to inflation and deflation factors. The data shows that 2014 and 2015 actually saw the largest increase in income inflation and are the years driving the increase — 2016 was just 3.76 percent compared to 8.23 percent in 2014 and 6.4 percent in 2015.

HUD is also applied a 7.01 percent deflation factor for the utility expense level (UEL) due to declines in oil and natural gas costs. HUD uses data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) to determine utility expense levels. HUD applies this deflation factor at the national level, regardless of the energy source used by an AMP. Although AMPs that utilize oil or natural gas have seen savings, those that rely on other sources of energy have not.

<u>Resolution:</u> Whereas, Operating Fund subsidy eligibility has been declining in recent years due to HUD's application of a high formula income inflation factor and Utility Expense Level (UEL) deflation,

And, whereas, many PHAs have not seen increases in tenant rents or utility cost savings equal to what HUD is currently projecting,

And, whereas, many PHAs experienced significant subsidy decreases between Calendar Year (CY) 2016 and CY 2017 as a result of the high income inflation factor and the UEL deflation,

And, whereas, PHAs are at risk of receiving additional subsidy decreases for CY 2018 Operating Fund subsidies due to the declining Operating Fund subsidy eligibility,

Be it resolved, NAHRO encourages staff to work with HUD to develop short-term fixes to the Operating Fund income inflation factor and the Utility Expense Level (UEL) inflation/deflation factor while continuing discussions with HUD on longer term fixes.

1. MARC By-Laws

Background: MARC proposed additions and changes to its current bylaws. They were minor in scope and consisted of clarifying who was considered an active or honorary member and their qualifications. It also clarified the role of the Executive Board and when meetings should be held. Information on holding emergency meetings and virtual attendance was also added, and they made minor changes to the role of the President and Senior Vice President. They updated the section on when election nominations would take place and how to fill vacancies, and finally they made adjustments to the make-up of each committee. A copy of the by-laws, complete with changes, is attached.

Resolution: The Member Services Committee moves the acceptance of the additions and changes to the MARC bylaws.

1. 2018 Budget

<u>Background</u>: The B&A Committee met on Thursday and had a thorough review and discussion of the 2018 budget proposed by NAHRO staff. Also present were the President, Senior Vice President and incoming B&A members. The Committee received presentations from each operating department heads along with their corresponding Committee Chairs. Although the 2018 proposal is for a deficit budget the Committee feels that, given the positive trend in operating performance in the current year and new leadership at the CEO level, NAHRO will continue the path towards sustainability.

Resolution: The B&A Committee recommends that the BOG adopt the 2018 budget proposal as presented with the understanding that the B&A Committee will continue to work closely with the CEO, CFO and NAHRO staff as they move toward closing the deficit.
